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Introduction

Children and young people live in a fast-moving world where instant gratification is increasingly seen as the norm. However, a toxic mix of social media, celebrity culture and rampant commercialism can lead to impossible expectations and an unrealistic sense of entitlement.

Of course, the converse effect is that when things do get hard, as they inevitably will, many children will show a lack of resilience or will simply give up. "I can't do it, there's no point." This is an example of a fixed mindset where children believe that being 'good' at a particular activity is something that they cannot control. But what if we can teach children to have a growth mindset instead? Mistakes and setbacks are seen as learning opportunities while success is rightly framed in the context of perseverance and trial and error. Now "I can't do it" becomes "I can't do it... YET".

InnerDrive and Kingston Grammar School are delighted to be working in partnership and our national conference is aimed at teachers in both secondary and primary schools. Expert national and international speakers include psychologists and educators as well as Dame Katherine Grainger DBE, Great Britain's most successful Olympian. Key topics will include:

- How can teachers help disengaged students with a fixed mindset?



Keynote Speaker – Dame Katherine Grainger DBE



Dame Katherine Grainger DBE was born in Glasgow on the 12th November 1975. She is Britain's most decorated female Olympic athlete and the first British woman to win medals at five successive Games.

Katherine graduated in Law from Edinburgh University, then went on to achieve an MPhil in Medical Law and Medical Ethics at Glasgow University, and in May 2013 completed a PhD in the sentencing of homicide at King's College, University of London.

She took up rowing at Edinburgh University in 1993 and made such good progress she was awarded the Eva Bailey Trophy as their most outstanding female athlete in 1996 and again in 1997 when she won her first international gold medal at the U23 World Rowing Championships.

In 2012 Katherine's dreams were realised when she won the elusive Olympic gold medal alongside teammate Anna Watkins in the double sculls in London.

With Olympic silver at Rio 2016 and gold at London 2012 to add to her silver medals from Sydney in 2000, Athens in 2004 and Beijing in 2008, as well as six World Championship titles in her collection, Katherine was appointed Commander of the Order of the British Empire (CBE) for services to rowing in the 2013 New Year's Honours. To round off a most exceptional 20-year rowing career, Katherine was named 'Dame Katherine Grainger' in the 2017 New Year's Honours List for services to rowing and charity.

She now lives by the Thames, near to the GB Rowing Squad base.

She has spent time working in schools and living with teachers in six 'top-performing' education systems which was the basis for her book, 'Cleverlands: the secrets behind the success of the world's education superpowers', one of The Economist's 'Books of the Year 2016'. On her return, Lucy wrote a book on teacher career structures for IIEP UNESCO, and spent a year as part of a team advising foreign governments on education reform at Education Development Trust.

Jessica Schleider – Researcher at Harvard University

Jessica Schleider, MA is a doctoral candidate in Clinical Psychology at Harvard University. Her research has focused on mindset and mental health in students and has been published in numerous peer-reviewed journals, including the Journal of the American Academy of Child & Adolescent Psychiatry, Clinical Psychology Review, and the Journal of Child Psychology and Psychiatry.

Jonnie Noakes – Head of Teaching at Eton College

Jonnie Noakes is Head of Teaching and Learning at Eton College and directs the Tony Little Centre for Innovation and Research in Learning. Part of the Centre's role is to conduct original, school-based research and it has recently completed a study of the impact of teaching Growth Mindset on the pro-social behaviour of Year 12 students. He is also on the board of BrainCanDo, a charity which conducts research at schools that are part of the Grey Coat Hospital and United Westminster Schools Foundations. He is a trustee of these two foundations, and a governor of state and independent schools.

Chris Hildrew – Head Teacher at Churchill Academy

Chris Hildrew is Head Teacher at Churchill Academy & Sixth Form and is passionate about excellence in state education. Upon graduating from Oxford University, Chris taught English before becoming Deputy Head at Chew Valley School. He has launched and developed a growth mindset ethos as Head Teacher at Churchill Academy & Sixth Form, an experience captured in his book, 'Becoming A Growth Mindset School'.

Her research specialised on helping children develop secure attachments and social and emotional wellbeing so that they feel confident learners.
